

From the YRMC Newsroom Hybrid Operating Room (OR) opens in the James Family Heart Center at YRMC West

Western Yavapai County residents of all ages who suffer from heart rhythm disorders (arrhythmias) now may receive specialized treatment from Cardiac Electrophysiologist Nisha Tung-Takher, MD, who recently joined Yavapai Regional Medical Center (YRMC) PhysicianCare Cardiology. The Hybrid OR allows Dr. Tung-Takher to diagnose patients using permanently integrated imaging equipment and then immediately follow this with a therapeutic procedure.

BreastCare Center Expands Mammography Service Days at YRMC East

For many women, their weeks are so full with family, work and other commitments that it's a challenge to find time for an annual screening mammogram. Beginning October 10, the Center will offer screening mammography services the second Saturday of each month from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm.

Cost is another barrier for some women. The Community BreastCare Fund, managed by YRMC, provides free screening mammography to women throughout western Yavapai County who lack adequate health insurance.
