Fred lived in Phoenix for 48 years, working for Allied Signal for 34 of those years. Fred retired in 1993, and moved to Prescott in 1994. He has a daughter and grandson living in Minnesota. Fred joined YRMC as a volunteer in 1995, beginning as a courtesy cart driver and then adding Ambassador duties later that year. In 1996 the Resource Desk, as it was called, was opened in the area now serving as Human Resources reception. The people at that desk served many functions for departments all along that hallway, but their main job was to assist the Endoscopy Department. Fred was selected as the first Chairperson for the Resource Desk. 12 years later he still serves in that capacity, with a few breaks in between through the years. In 2006 the Endoscopy department moved to its current location on the main floor and Fred went with it. He says, "I have the best group of volunteers in the hospital working with me so they make my job as chairman easy. The staff in Endoscopy are great to work with – they treat us like part of the staff."

"In 2006 Fred began working at the Information Desk in the main lobby, too, which he enjoys, and he says the person he works with is great. He enjoys volunteering at YRMC, enjoys helping people and giving back to his community.

"Fred has contributed nearly 4400 hours to YRMC in his career here. He and Roger (see below) were coincidentally our very first two MVV way back when the award began in 1996. We thought it would be fun to re-run that original photo along with the new one taken as they received their awards from CEO Tim Barnett! Fred is one of the very few three time MVV winners, and was both Volunteer of the Year and the very

What is an MVV

Most people don't really have a guess, and those who do think it stands for Most Valuable Volunteer... but it really stands for Mission, Vision and Values, and is what we call the highest award a YRMC volunteer can receive. The Mission, Vision and Values Award for volunteers was instituted to recognize volunteers who demonstrate a special understanding of how the YRMC Mission. Vision and Values apply to the daily volunteer routines.

The MVV Award differs from the T.E.A.M. awards in that it is only for volunteers, while the T.E.A.M. award is for any staff member, physician, department or volunteer.

Selection of the monthly MVV winner is made by the all Volunteer Advisory Committee, and it is from the 12 monthly winners that the annual Volunteer of the Year is chosen. The Volunteer of the Year was begun in 1999, and the winners represent the best and brightest of our YRMC volunteers. The MVV winners are awarded a special pin by CEO Tim Barnett, and have their photo and a biography printed in The Pulse, the volunteer newsletter which comes out roughly every 2-3 months.

In addition to understanding what the MVV award is, we'd like everyone to know that anyone can nominate a special volunteer for the award. Often it is the staff working side by side with the volunteer who is in the best position to see how much that volunteer contributes. Therefore it is the staff who might be most likely to see performance that is above and beyond. Nominate a volunteer! MVV Award nomination forms are in the top bin on the wall outside the volunteer office, or you can pick up one at the lobby Information Desk. Volunteer of the Year honors were presented to three very special people; VOY West Campus, VOY East Campus, and VOY Hospice. Information about what makes these three people so remarkable follows: Waldo Bennier has had a long career serving various organizations as a volunteer, including his church, the Elks, and some 25 years at a VA hospital in Long Beach, CA. Quite often this happens late at night. Sally is passionate about her work and is obviously a tremendous support to YRMC Hospice patients, caregivers and families.

One of our goals will be to get more of them over here so people can get to know each other.

What Goes On In The Del E. Webb Building?

YRMC opened the Del E. Webb Outpatient Center on August, 1997 as a first step in expanding YRMC services into the Prescott Valley community. The unimposing building is home to a variety of services and programs. The **Information Desk** is located in the lobby of the building. Volunteers in that position also staff the small kiosk stocked with sundries and small gifts that are available for sale to staff and visitors. On the First Floor is a state of the art **Laboratory** and **Imaging Services**. **Office Space** for **Physicians** is available so Prescott doctors can see patients in a more convenient location for PV residents. The second floor includes the home base for **YRMC Hospice** and **Home Health**, rooms for **Speech**, **Physical** and **Occupational Therapies**, **Employee Health** and **Wellness**, and the **Pendleton Center**, a fitness center equipped with a full line of exercise equipment with space for **Pulmonary Rehab** and **Diabetes Education**.

The YRMC DEW Outpatient Center was built as a standalone building. Several years later, Yavapai County Health Department received a grant which required collaboration with another agency to build the addition allowing them to offer community services. Even though the two facilities share a common wall, they are actually separate and distinct in their purpose and their "ownership."

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Recently YRMC was recognized in the Arizona Healthcare and Hospital Association newsletterhere is their report....

Three Arizona Hospitals Recognized for Patient Safety

HealthGrades has released its fifth annual Patient Safety in American Hospitals Study which cites three Arizona hospitals as Distinguished Hospitals for Patient Safety. Those recognized are:

- Mayo Clinic Hospital, Phoenix
- Yavapai Regional Medical Center
 - Yuma Regional Medical Cennter

To identify these hospitals, HealthGrades researchers analyzed approximately 41 million Medicare patient records from nearly 5000 hospitals. Facilities earning the Distinguished Hospitals for Patient Safety designation demonstrated patient safety records among the top 5 percent in the nation across 13 patient safety indicators. On average, these hospitals were found to have a 43 percent lower chance of experiencing one or more medical errors, compared to those hospitals which demonstrated the lowest ranking patient safety records. HealthGrades, Inc. is a healthcare ratings organization, (not an accrediting organization) providing ratings and profiles of hospitals, nursing homes and physicians.
